Over the summer I will be working with Alison, our Christian Education Board, and our Church School and Confirmation teachers to plan for the fall so that our ministry to children and youth will continue to thrive next year.

This community means a great deal to me. I am continually in awe of the commitment and creativity of our leadership in this congregation. And I have found here many friends with whom I hope to stay in touch for years to come. I am confident that there are many great things ahead for this church. Saugatuck will continue to be in my thoughts and prayers as I go. I hope that I will continue to be in yours.



Summer Stewardship

Stewardship as wisdom tells us is a year round discipline. As we head into the summer consider pre-paying your summer pledge. The church continues its mission throughout the summer and because of that experiences normal monthly operating expenses. Many of us

are away much of the summer and don't think to pay down our pledge over the time we're gone. This places stress on the church's cash flow and sometimes critically so. Cash flow and a 2015 budget gap that needs to be filled make it all the more important for the faithful to assist in any way you can. Here are some great ways to help:

Pre-pay your summer months' pledge payments.

Sign up for auto-deduction from your bank. It is a convenient way for you to pay but it also creates a predictable and consistent cash flow. I personally use recurring payments which is very easy to set up. Alternatively if you give our bookkeeper your routing number and bank account each month 1/12 of your pledge is auto-deducted from your account.

If you pledge, think about increasing what you pledge. If you don't pledge there is no better time than now to join with the faithful in support this church's mission.

Always keep the church in mind when you prepare your will. We will soon be delving deeper into best practice for bequests.

During the last few days of the month, June 26-July 1, I will be traveling to Cleveland, OH for the bi-annual national gathering of the United Church of Christ (UCC). *You can join me!* Tune in for inspiring worship and keynote addresses streamed live throughout the week! Here's how General Synod is described on the Synod website:

"Every two years, General Synod brings together thousands of faithful members of the United Church of Christ for formal church witness, inspirational worship, and fellowship with friends (new and old).

In June 2015, thousands from across the country (and abroad) will gather for General Synod 30 in Cleveland, Ohio—the birthplace of the United Church of Christ. Together, we will discern resolutions of witness, church structure, and function. We will stand up for issues that demand a faithful witness. And we will join together in worship each day to lift up the Stillspeaking God.

At General Synod 30, we will explore some of the 'Unexpected Places' where we hear God's voice, encounter the Spirit, and find the United Church of Christ lifting up its witness in the world."

The business of the meeting will include consideration of sixteen 'resolutions' that address a wide range of topics including immigration, the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, renewable energies, socially responsible investing, and mass incarceration.

Resolutions passed at General Synod inform and guide the work of our national church (public advocacy positions our General Minister might take or educational materials the national office might develop, for example). They do not impose a position on local churches. As a denomination, we affirm both local autonomy and covenant. That means that a local church can discern its own direction, but we do so in conversation with, and informed by our relationships with the other churches and settings of the UCC. I'll let you know what resolutions are passed at General Synod. If there's a topic you'd like us to explore further as a congregation or in a small group, let me know!

While I'm in Cleveland, I am also looking forward to spirit-filled worship, dynamic preaching, time to connect with colleagues and my seminary (Chicago Theological Seminary), and the chance to participate in a service project to support literacy. We will be stuffing backpacks with school supplies to be distributed to children within the Cleveland Municipal School District by the UCC's community partner, University Settlement.



Troop 36 Set to Honor Three New Eagle Scouts

Three Troop 36 Scouts, Peter Campbell, Steven Bean, and Ben Waller, will receive their Eagle Rank awards at a Court of Honor on Saturday, June 6, 1 pm at the Saugatuck Congregational Church.

The rank of Eagle signifies leadership, service, outdoor skills, good citizenship and ethical behavior of the highest order.

It also represents years of commitment to a goal, which has been supported by families, Scout leaders and the community. Twenty-one merit badges are required for the Eagle rank in addition to a leadership service project.

Ben Waller is the most recent scout to pass his Eagle Board of Review on April 30. Ben's achievement of Boy Scouts of America's highest rank caps his 12 years involvement in scouting, beginning in first grade with Cub Scouts. Ben currently serves as Troop 36's Senior Patrol Leader, the highest youth leadership position in a troop. Ben's Eagle Scout Project involved building refuse receptacles for the Town of Westport which are currently being used at Wakeman Field. Ben is a senior at Staples High School, where he is involved in SLOBs (Service League of Boys), Student Ambassadors, and Saferides, as well as being a member of the Westport Youth Commission. Ben is also very passionate about his religion and has continued to study Judaism throughout high school. He has been a competitive rower for the Saugatuck Rowing Club since the freshman year of high school. Next year Ben plans on attending the University of Wisconsin where he plans to continue to row at the college level.

Peter Campbell joined Troop 36 in 2010. His Eagle project was done to benefit Sherwood Island State Park. It entailed constructing interpretive panels to display the information and findings of a recent archaeological dig of a colonial homestead at Sherwood Island, as well as to provide the history and context of these findings. Peter is first violin in the Principal Orchestra of the Greater Bridgeport Youth Orchestras and has performed with his group at Carnegie Hall. He volunteers at the Westport Center for Senior Activities and Bridgeport Hospital. Peter graduated summa cum laude from Fairfield Prep and will attend Johns Hopkins University in the fall where he plans to major in pre-med.

Steven Bean joined Troop 36 in 2007. His Eagle project was done to benefit Green's Farms Congregational Church where he worships. The project involved cleaning 300 gravestones at the Lower Cemetery and repositioning 40 of those that had moved out of place. Besides his scout troop, Steven had volunteers from school and church. Steven is a senior at Staples High School. He is gifted with a baritone voice which he uses to lead the troop in song. Recently, he sang the Star Spangled Banner before a Bridgeport Bluefish game. Steven plans to attend Fairfield University in the fall where he will focus his studies on business or communications.

Members of the community are welcome to attend Troop 36's Eagle Court of Honor at Saugatuck Congregational Church, which charters Troop 36. Craig Patton serves as Scoutmaster.

Fairfield Relay for Life, held on the grounds of Fairfield Ludlowe High School_saw thousands take to the school's track from Saturday evening into Sunday morning, stepping up in support of the fight against cancer.

The largest fundraiser in the area benefiting the American Cancer Society, this year's event drew 173 fundraising teams, with roughly 1,800 participants. Organizers noted that, as of Friday morning, \$216,000 had been pledged, and in Fairfield over the 16 years there has been a Relay for Life fundraiser, \$3 million has been raise for the cancer society.

In recent years, the event has taken on a festival -like atmosphere, with music, food sales, speakers and more.

A traditional, more somber feature was the lighting of luminaria dedicated to the memory of loved ones who had lost their battle with cancer.

Refreshed at Clergy Camp

SHARON (05/15/2015) -- The second annual Clergy Camp retreat brought sixteen UCC ministers from around the state to Silver



Lake Conference Center for two days of laughter, song, silence, challenges, worship, games, and inspiration. They paddled canoes, played under the rainbow panels of a parachute, scaled tall trees, and reveled in the scents of a Connecticut spring.

Led by co-Deans the Rev. Liz Miller (Congregational Church of South Glastonbury UCC) and the Rev. Kent Siladi (Connecticut Conference Minister), each day's activities were clearly set out — and quickly adapted to the inclinations of the group. The assembled clergy were clearly attracted by bright colors, whether it was the small group hovering over the table where the puzzle came together, or the tie-dye T-shirt prepared by the Rev. Jocelyn Gardner Spencer (First Congregational Church UCC, Woodstock).

Some of the participants have served the United Church of Christ for decades, and one will begin his first call in June. They came from different settings of ministry, including senior pastors, solo pastors, associate pastors, and conference staff. Each brought a distinct sense of joy and wonder, which they applied to varieties of tea (a group left the camp for an hour to explore a tea shop in nearby Millerton) and to climbing the trees of Silver Lake's High Ropes Challenge Course.

In addition to finding refreshment, these church leaders gained a deeper appreciation for the each other. Shawn Fisher (Groton Congregational Church UCC) sang two of his original compositions during communion worship, and the Rev. Erick Olsen (Norfolk Church of Christ UCC) got everybody around the parachute. Worship included a bowl to receive stones emblazoned with cares to be left behind, and water which floated flowers of new commitments. Conference Minister the Rev. Kent Siladi and the Rev. Sandy Koenig (North Congregational Church UCC, Woodbury) presided over the taste of grace in the service of communion.

This experience of wonder, refreshment, and grace is renewed each week during the summer at Silver Lake Conference Center for the young people who come to run, sing, shout, climb, explore, learn, worship, and renew. The assembled ministers returned home with the summer calendar and a new determination to share the blessings of God's Back Yard with those whom they serve.
